INTRODUCTION

The importance for the history of literature and science of the academies that flourished in Italy from the late fifteenth through the eighteenth centuries, some of them still continuing to this day, has always been recognised. The relevance to the visual arts of these learned institutions (as against those academies specifically devoted to the fine arts) has received less study. Yet paintings, medals, and, above all, prints were produced in honour of the academies and of their individual members.

These 'academic' works of art can be recognised by their inclusion of the academies' *imprese*, or emblems. However, they have often proved hard to interpret because they sometimes omit the title of the academy. In preparatory studies, the motto too may be absent. The need for a full index of figures, as well as mottoes, is increased by the habit of incorporating them into some fitting 'historical' scene, in which the emblem itself may occupy only an insignificant place, or may even be broken up into its constituent parts.

It is primarily for the identification of these works that the present index has been prepared from the standard and invaluable five volumes of Michele Maylender, *Storia delle accademie d'Italia* (Bologna, 1926–30). The author did not live to provide an introduction, and the only index is of the cities in which the academies flourished (the academies being treated in alphabetical order, according to their titles). It is therefore to be hoped that this index may be of more general use to those interested in the academies of Italy.

It is intended that it should be used in conjunction with Maylender's book, and no details are given of the academies, their dates or their membership. Frequently two academies would join, sometimes taking over the emblem of one of the original academies; I have given the names of all academies to use a particular emblem. However, I have not noted changes of name within one academy, using the name given by Maylender.

Maylender's volume has been supplemented by additions and corrections available in the following works, which are listed here preceded by the abbreviation used to identify them in the indexes:

On rare occasions when an emblem is known to me but not listed in any of these, I have included it, with a footnote reference to my source.

When the source used is Maylender, this has been given simply as the volume and page number, within round brackets. Where the sources refer to an academy not included in Maylender, the reference is given as (Cas.), (Fanti), etc.; where Maylender describes the academy but not its emblem, or where these other sources have been preferred, the reference to Maylender is put within square brackets.

Otherwise, no attempt has been made to go beyond the information in Maylender, to correct the errors that have been noted by later writers, or to add to the information he provides.

Emblems proposed, but not adopted, have not been included, nor have those of the individual members. Where a second, or even a third emblem has been adopted subsequently, all are given.

In the index of **mottoes**, discrepancies of reading have been noted only when they are of some substance; only occasionally have I noted differences in spelling. An exception is made where these occur in the first

word: if such a discrepancy would displace the motto so that it might be missed by the reader, the alternative has been included as a separate motto; where the difference is due to an obvious misprint in Maylender, the correct reading only is given, and the misprint noted in a footnote.

The index of **figures** has been made in English, under the object which seems to be the most prominent. This has involved the attempt to visualise the emblem, which is not always easy from a brief written description;² again, Ms. Casanatense 1028, Ferro, and the book edited by Fanti have been useful, but their coverage is limited. When there is a discrepancy between my reading of an image and Maylender's description based on the same source, I have followed my own interpretation.³ Otherwise, I have attempted to follow the text of Maylender as closely as possible, even when the description seems dubious.

Cross references are given in capitals from other objects of the image that might catch the eye of anyone attempting to identify an emblem; cross references in lower case are provided from general types (e.g. 'TREE') to specifics (e.g. 'bay'), since these are not always easy to identify in small images.

The **abbreviation** 'Acc. d.' has been used for 'Accademia dei' 'Accademia de' or 'Accademia degli'; other forms of the possessive article have been written out.

I am grateful to Charles Hope and Richard Simpson for their help in preparing this booklet on the computer, to the generous assistance of Giovanna Perini in interpreting the Italian, to that of Kristen Lippincott for various astrological emblems, and to the patience of Timothy Wilson in providing English translations for the Italian heraldry.

² It should be borne in mind that, very frequently, Maylender was himself quoting written sources, rather than a visual image; where it has been possible to check these sources, it appears that he took over the descriptions verbatim.

³ For example, Maylender describes all winged figures as Angels; those that are blowing I have called Winds. He also describes as a twisted wax taper a figure normally called Solomon's Knot, and the latter interpretation has been adopted. There are three pages of index to the figures in Casanatense 1028, and these written descriptions often enable one to correct a reading of the image.
